FROM YOUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I am so pleased to announce the receipt of grants in the amounts of \$2,500 to work with zero waste school cafeterias through Seven Generations Ahead (a Full Circle Foundation grant) and \$10,000 for stream crossing signs also through the Full Circle Foundation. And, we are incredibly grateful for continued support from the Grand Victoria Foundation in the amount of \$75,000 over the next two years! Diversifying where our funding comes from, including grants, membership (both general and business), IRA required minimum distribution donations, the Fundraising Team's work on various fundraising projects, the annual appeal and dinner, is all so vital to our continued success and ability to support our growing staff and programs. We are grateful to all those who support us as grantors and volunteers. And, we are thankful for all the partnerships throughout the community that help make our work so relevant and in many ways, possible.



This month, to honor Earth Month, I will be kicking off a town by town plastic reduction tour with help from the Environmental Defenders' Waste Reduction Action Team members. The purpose is to bring continued awareness to the problems of plastic in our environment here in McHenry County. Inspired by our Defenders' Waste Reduction Team's Sustainability Summit held on January 31, 2022 and work we've been doing in the area of single use plastic reduction for the past decade, we will deliver a message to our towns' council members and trustees regarding the urgency of reducing single-use plastics, including bags, straws, bottles, take out containers and balloons. Results of an Environmental Defenders' microsplastic study will also be shared while encouraging local legislation as a means to mitigate this environmental problem.

Related to advocating, it is crucial that as Environmental Defenders we stay engaged with our elected officials on the local level (and state level through the Illinois Environmental Council), so that we can all support one another, learn, share and work toward communities that are more resilient and that create lasting plans to preserve and protect the environment. If you are interested in being a part of advocacy work, please contact me and learn more about becoming an Environmental Ambassador. Ambassadors keep informed of local meeting agendas in their respective home towns and help keep our office and teams informed of environmental actions that may be of interest. Paddle the Kish & Paddle On! Event

Paddle On Outfitters has teamed up with the Environmental Defenders of McHenry County and Paddle the Kish in Marengo. Join us April 30th for a leisure paddle through the North Branch of Kishwaukee River. Our voyage will begin at 10am by parking at Siems Memorial Park in Union. There Paddle On will have your kayaks ready for you. If you would like to bring your own kayak, Paddle On will have a shuttle service available. Tickets for rentals and shuttles are available at www.paddleonoufitters.com or their Ticket Tailor link: https://buytickets.at/paddleonoufitters.com/653663. All paddlers are required to fill out a paperless waiver after you have purchased a rental or shuttle ticket.

The trip could take up to 3 hours to complete. We will be keeping track of water levels throughout that week. We highly encourage bringing towels, plenty of water and a light snack. All rentals will have life jackets provided along with paddles. Dry boxes will be available to rent through the Ticket Tailor link. All paddlers bringing their own kayak are highly encouraged to provide their own life jackets.

Age requirements: All ages are able to attend. We do not encourage newborns or very small infants to attend due to the potential dangers. Trained guides will be available if you are a beginner and/or want to learn. After the trip, Paddle On will provide a shuttle back to Siems Memorial Park. Checkers is a local favorite in Union, and all who attend are encouraged to visit after the trip for lunch and a refreshing drink.


UPDATE FROM MCSEEP





Before Tom's presentation on climate change, we had Carla Baldwin of Baldwin Web Design in Crystal Lake (top right) present our members with the Defenders' new website which went live the following week. Tom Skilling, introduced by Nancy Schietzelt, was the highlight of the evening with his presentation titled "Climate change is here and real, its effects already evident. Weather extremes are up, increasingly impactful and expensive. There's such misinformation out there and from sources ill-informed on the subject. Scientists have been onto the notion our planet would warm since the 1800's – it's not a new concept at all." We had several members submit questions to Tom, which he will answer and we will share via our email mailing list. And if you missed his presentation, we filmed it live and posted it on the Defenders' Facebook, and it will also be posted on the Defenders' YouTube.

During the business portion of the dinner, we presented five awards.

The Theta Award went to Small Waters Education (below) for their work on advocating for, creating and helping to maintain "outdoor classroom" native gardens for pollinators at schools; for inspiring the youth in our county to help take care of the land and its critters; for serving the Latino community with Spanish pollinator garden brochures and through program participation with Conversación de Conservación — a partnering of community and conservation organizations; for working on the county's first Food Forest with The Land Conservancy; and for all their work in educating our community on the importance of land and soil health, especially in the areas of permaculture, and deep ecology; and for being a leading local resource for practical information and education about building a healthy ecosystem for all.



















The Government Award was presented to McHenry County Division of Transportation (top left) for their leadership in coupling environmental sustainability with a safe and efficient transportation system; for partnering with us to install signage identifying names of streams and their watersheds at road crossings; for naturalizing their roadsides; for continuing to be a leader in the sensible salting movement; for installing environmentally-friendly and crash-reducing roundabouts; and for offering McRide and pursuing 'Complete Streets' to provide better, equitable options for people to bike, walk and use transit to move around our county.

The Business Award was given to Julie Ann's Custard (left, second from top) for their passion for their community and the environment, for their use of compostable containers and packaging, for sourcing ingredients locally, and for offering vegan options for their guests.

Larry Baum (left, third from top) was awarded the Volunteer of the Year Award for seamlessly taking over the reins to help operate The Defenders' Styrofoam Collection Program and for constantly thinking of ways to improve the process; for logistics of scheduling trucks, people power, supplies, improvements to sheds and reporting volunteer hours and needs; for increasing seasons sheds are open and for his excellent and consistent communication skills of program needs.

And last but not least, the Young Defender award was given to Mac Hansen (bottom left) for their volunteerism at The Green Spot Used Book Store and for their devotion to saving books from the landfill, creativity with decorating the store and outstanding friendliness with customers, and for helping to keep the store open on Mondays which helps to earn money for our environmental protection projects.

We reached the Summit

On January 31, 2022 70 local leaders gathered to listen, learn, collaborate and create goals to make McHenry County more sustainable. This did not happen on a whim, but by the hard work of the Waste Reduction Team.

Let's start from the beginning. At a meeting in early 2021 co-chair Michell Myrun mentioned how there are many resources to become sustainable, but they are not always shared. She thought if we could have a meeting, like a summit, to gather people to discuss what barriers they have we could collaborate to find solutions. Cynthia Kanner was at this meeting and she loved the idea, and came back to us with a grant from the Aptar group! The summit "seed" had been planted and now we needed to make it grow.



I reached out to the EPA Region 5 Director on food waste and asked if she would be our keynote. I got an immediate, enthusiastic yes, and we continued to get so many yeses. So many people were willing to help us! The EPA Region 7 office has held several food waste summits, and met with us and explained how to organize the summit. The Illinois Sustainability Center at UIUC introduced us to potential speakers, Illinois Food Scrap Coalition reviewed our speaker list and gave suggestions. The list goes on.

For the Summit to be a reality it took more than the chairs meeting with organizations to secure the agenda and speakers. It took the amazing hard work of our team. Zak Dolezal dedicated an exorbitant amount of time and worked tirelessly. He was able to secure our second keynote, which discussed single-use plastic reduction; speakers for the restaurant break out session; and a second sponsor who would give restaurants free samples of compostable takeout containers. He also hit the pavement and personally invited many restaurants. When the chips were down and we were concerned about the whole thing coming together, we had Kelli Boeckman. She swooped in and brought the fire and magic back to the team. She became one of the most valued members. She was able to use her resources at the county to make this a reality. Her list of contacts and personal connections were instrumental in getting the word out for the Summit. We went from 1 to 50 attendees by her sending one email.

We have a few members who I say "attended the fire and got the firewood when we needed it." Ashley Lange and Annette Parrent worked tirelessly on the backend. Ashley, who never used Google Docs, is now proficient in maintaining documents, making spreadsheets and can also give you all the ins and outs on how to use Eventbrite. She worked daily to keep our lists up-to-date so we knew who to continue to reach out to about the Summit. She didn't stop there; she relentlessly ensured all her friends and family reached out to their local leaders to attend the Summit. She had so many hidden talents that blossomed. Annette Parrent is a woman who knows how to use her time well. We can all learn efficiency skills from her. She helped design emails, flyers and made contact lists so quickly we couldn't keep up. She was an instrumental part of making our school breakout session a success. We can't thank her enough. We are so lucky to have 2 board members on our team, Zak Dolezal and Claire Hodge. Claire kept all of us on our toes. If you need someone to make a list, she is your person. I would think there is not much else to do then I would look at Claire's list and be reminded we weren't close to the finish line. She thought of everything! Claire challenged us and pushed us to do our best.

Oh, the Summit itself. Sorry, I couldn't stop writing about our amazing team. The day went without a hitch, no internet or signing-on issues and we had a great turnout. 120 people registered and 70 attended. Not bad for a bunch of newbies. Our keynotes did amazing presentations explaining the issues with waste and climate change with great examples and resources. We later broke out into 3 sessions: municipal leaders, restaurants and schools. The municipality's session focused on curbside composting, how to work with your hauler, plastic bag tax and building a sustainability committee. We had 7 towns, the county board and one chamber of commerce represented. They listened and brought back all the information to their towns to reevaluate their goals. It was great to hear that many of them learned a lot and needed time to absorb. The restaurant group had real concrete goals to begin composting and find alternatives to Styrofoam/plastic containers. They were presented with great resources and will be collaborating to gain better prices for sustainable materials. The school breakout was our most lively group. The pandemic has stalled some of their plans, but teachers love to plan for the future. Many ideas were discussed: shared tables, composting and decreasing food waste. It was inspiring to see what our schools want to do. If you want to get involved with your local schools, this is a great time. As we closed our computers at the end of the day that Monday morning, we saw the fruits of our labor begin to blossom. That seed we planted 8 months earlier had grown into a beautiful budding plant that needs continuous care. Our work is not nearly done and we hope this little plant turns into a field of opportunity. We couldn't' have accomplished this without the work of the team. We are forever grateful and can't wait to see what happens next.


