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

Reducing Food Waste from the Grocery Store to Your Fridge

Springtime is a great time of year for the Waste Reduction Team. We celebrate Food Waste Prevention Week and International Compost Awareness Week. So this is a perfect time to review how you can be more sustainable in the kitchen.

TACKLING THE FRIDGE

- Upper shelves are warmer. Great place for leftovers and ready to eat foods as in yogurt and cheese.
- Lowest shelf is the coldest. Best place to store meats.
- High humidity is for foods that wilt as in broccoli, herbs, carrots, etc.
- Low humidity is for foods that rot as in apples, grapes, mushrooms.
- Do not overfill. Foods needs air to circulate to keep fresh.
- Use clear containers so you don't forget what is in your fridge.

BETTER APPROACHES TO GROCERY SHOPPING

Plan your meals ahead.

Use the bulk aisle to ensure you buy only how much you need.

Use *Handpick.com* to find recipes of foods already have in your home.

Stick to the list. Only 16% of us do!

Boone Creek Cleanup

MAINTAINING A CLEAN CREEK

On March 29th, Defenders' Water & Natural Resources Protection Action Team and Boone-Dutch Creeks Watershed Alliance hosted their annual spring litter cleanup on Boone Creek. A crew of nine undertook two hours of cleaning up litter along both sides of the creek, working south from the City of McHenry's Public Works Building to Rte 120. Due to all the trash that accumulates along the creek here, especially on the west side where it blows off a shopping center parking lot, the crew was not able to completely clean up the west side. They collected 66 pounds of trash and 9 pounds of

recyclables that the City of McHenry disposed of and recycled. Saved for reuse were two cast iron frypans and a pair of unopened sunglasses. The crew is following up with the grocery store and shopping center management and the City of McHenry to figure out ways to reduce the trash and to capture and clean it up regularly before it reaches the creek. Everyone who helped out is much appreciated!

These include walks, stewardship events at pollinator gardens and natural areas, and a wrap-up celebration on Sunday, June 22nd at the McHenry County Conservation District's Prairie View Education Center.

Building Partnerships in Education

McHenry County Schools Environmental Education Program

OUR EDUCATIONAL REACH

McHenry County Schools Environmental Education Program had a great year. This year, Environmental Educators - Hannah Pfaff, Gigi Carlson, and Abby Winters - brought our lessons to over 10,000 students here in McHenry County.

For the remainder of the school year we will be visiting Crosby Elementary School in Harvard, North Elementary School in Crystal Lake, Chesak Elementary School in Huntley, Harrison School in Wonder Lake, Ringwood School Primary Center in Ringwood, Westwood Elementary School in Woodstock, Northwood Middle School in Woodstock, The Goddard School in Lake in the Hills, Johnsburg Elementary School in Johnsburg, and Creekside Middle School in Woodstock.

SUMMER PLANNING

This summer, our work will be focused on building partnerships. We aim to begin work with the McHenry County Conservation District to help with the Openlands program - Birds in Our Neighborhood. MCSEEP and MCCD education will be taking over this program for McHenry County starting in September of 2025. As director, I will also be busy with fundraising to reduce the cost we must pass on to schools. The true cost to deliver our program to students is about \$125 per classroom. We currently charge schools \$30 per classroom. Over the summer months, our goal is to reduce the cost to our public schools as they face a looming loss of funds at the same time of rising prices, so I will be looking for additional funds from private donors and grants.

This summer we are looking for two people interested in joining MCSEEP as Environmental Educators. This is an ideal part-time position with variable hours each week for retired teachers, stay-at-home parents with children in school and young teachers still looking for that first position. Please share this information with those who might be interested.

Setting Fire To the Prairies

Prescribed Burnings with the Defenders

BURNING FOR NEW GROWTH

On March 26th, a team of Defenders preformed a prescribed burn at our Dean Street property. Ten volunteers grabbed their flappers, water packs, and torches and burned the patch of prairie. Approximately 6 acres were encompassed in the slow burn. Hopefully, the fire killed most of the small woody shrubs that were encroaching on the grasses and forbs in the area. The Water and Natural Resources Protection Action Team and their interns have worked over the years to keep invasive species such as common parsnip, thistles, and autumn olives from spreading through the property. Removal of invasives and burning the area will gradually help the land become more naturalized.

HISTORY OF THE LAND

With a \$100,000 grant that the Defenders secured from the Grand Victoria Foundation and a financial partnership with the City of Woodstock, McHenry County Conservation District (MCCD) and the McHenry-Lake Soil and Water Conservation District, 111 acres were purchased in 2001 as the first piece of a complex that now protects the headwaters of the Kishwaukee River. The Defenders hold and maintain 8 acres of the area. Over the years since it was acquired, Defenders has continuously worked to restore the property. Together with the adjoining lands, 170 acres of wetlands, oaks, hickories and prairie are available for enjoyment.
