The Closing of The Green Spot

MOVING FORWARD: THE FUTURE OF THE GREEN READ

Change is rarely easy, especially when it involves places and people who have been an important part of our organization and community. After careful consideration, the Environmental Defenders of McHenry County Board made the difficult decision to close the Green Spot and focus our bookstore efforts on the Green Read in Crystal Lake.

This decision was not made quickly or lightly. For nearly a year, the Board has reviewed the Green Spot's financial situation and considered options for its future. Increasing operating costs, particularly rent and utilities, along with declining revenues, made it increasingly difficult for the store to remain financially sustainable.

Closing the Green Spot also required us to re-evaluate our bookstore staffing needs. After reviewing the finances, our treasurer determined that the Green Read can reasonably sustain a manager position of 20 hours per week as we work toward financial breakeven. Unfortunately, this means a significant reduction in compensation. Because Pam and Diane have been such dedicated and valued managers, we offered the revised position to them first. Ultimately, both decided they could not accept the reduced position, and we completely understand and respect their decisions.

Pam and Diane did an amazing job developing a plan for the move, and their hard work has set the Defenders up for success. We are incredibly grateful for the years of dedication, hard work, and care they have given to both bookstores. Their contributions have made a lasting impact on the Defenders and the many customers and volunteers who have come to know them.

LOOKING AHEAD TO THE GREEN READ

While closing the Green Spot marks the end of an important chapter, we are hopeful about the future of the Green Read.

Focusing our bookstore resources in one location allows us to build on the Green Read's strengths. Its updated space and increased foot traffic offer the potential to attract more customers, increase our visibility in the Crystal Lake community, and generate additional revenue to support the environmental work of the Defenders.

Moving forward, we will focus on making the Green Read an inviting and welcoming shopping destination. We look forward to working with our volunteers and a new bookstore manager to strengthen the store, build its customer base, and continue serving the community.

Most importantly, we want to recognize the tremendous role our bookstore staff and volunteers have played in making both bookstores successful. Recent feedback reinforced that one of the many things that makes our bookstores special is the welcoming atmosphere created by our staff and volunteers. That sense of welcome is something we hope to carry forward.

The Green Read is more than a bookstore, it is a place where people connect, discover something new, and support the environmental mission of the Defenders.

Closing the Green Spot is certainly bittersweet, but we are grateful for what both bookstores have meant to our organization and community, and for the people who have made them special. By bringing our bookstore efforts together at the Green Read and working toward financial sustainability, we believe we can build on that legacy while creating a stronger foundation for the future.

With the support of our volunteers, customers, and broader community, we look forward to making the Green Read a strong and sustainable part of the Defenders for years to come.

OUTDOOR VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

- Drive tractors to bring guests back and forth from tree field
- Shake and bale freshly cut trees
- Demonstrate period crafts and hands-on activities for children. (Candle dipping or wood working to make candle holders - no experience necessary)

WARMING HOUSE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The wood-stove-warmed Warming House offers guests hot cocoa, coffee, home-baked cookies and bars, and gift items made from natural materials. Volunteers are needed to help serve refreshments and welcome visitors. Our Water and Natural Resources Protection Action Team enjoyed a very productive summer with the Defenders' amazing interns, Hannah Peterson and Grace Petravick. Some of the team's goals that they helped us accomplish were:

- Collect another year of data measuring chloride levels in Boone Creek

- Weed the Silver Creek stream bank and weeded and planted additional plants to attract pollinators to the Defenders' pollinator garden at the McHenry County Fairgrounds in Woodstock

- Remove invasive species such as teasel, wild parsnip, and sweet clover from Triangle Prairie, O'Brien Prairie, and the Defenders' Dean Street property to improve these habitats

- Install an information sign for the public about pollinators at O'Brien Prairie

- Create handouts and buttons for children and designed a trivia game for use at the Defenders' table at the County Fair

- Share information with the public about all aspects of the Defenders' work at the County Fair

- Help weed and plant the pollinator gardens at Petersen Park with Conversacion de Conservacion

They also had an opportunity to learn from several experts in the county about various important environmental topics.

- Bird, fish, and butterfly surveys

- River samples and water resource management

- Conservation design and green infrastructure planning and conducting large environmental protection projects

BAKERS WANTED

Please join us in making the holiday season sweeter while supporting our organization!

Your homemade treats will be sold during Christmas tree sales at Pioneer Tree Farm, and every dollar raised will benefit the Environmental Defenders of McHenry County. Whether you bake one batch or several, your contribution will make a difference!

WHAT Cookies, brownies, and bar cookies

WHEN by November 25th & December 4th, 2026

*November 25th is our greatest need as the first weekend is the busiest!

HOW Package ALL baked goods as follows (this makes it much easier for the volunteers working the sales – it gets crazy in the warming house!)

(2 cookies of 2" diameter or greater – 3 cookies if they are smaller, 2 small brownies or 2 bar cookies). All must be sealed in clear or colored plastic (for sanitary and display reasons). Do NOT put on paper plates or ceramic ware. The zip locking type sandwich

or snack bags work great! All must be packaged/sealed at home and should be labeled with the type either with a slip of paper inside or you can even write, right on the package with a "Sharpie" felt tip pen. Please put your name and phone number on the box or bag they are brought in along with how many packages of each type. This will help with inventory management and the health department.

You can take the cookies to the Green Read in Downtown Crystal Lake or the Defenders' office (114 S Jefferson in Woodstock – call 815.338.0393 to make sure someone is there), the Monday-Wednesday before Thanksgiving or during the following week. Both locations are open between 10am – 3pm. All items are picked up by a fundraising team member and delivered to the Pioneer Tree Farm the next morning. Thank you in advance for your baking creations!

Qualified Charitable Distribution

As a grassroots organization, the Environmental Defenders of McHenry County has always relied on our members to support our mission – members who offer hours upon hours of donated time, pay annual membership dues, donate items to be sold in our bookstores and fundraisers, and generously give financial donations “above and beyond” their membership. Everything our members have done, and continue to do, is greatly appreciated, and we thank you for your loyal support! We would not exist today without members like you.

Over the past several years, to further build our financial strength, we have continued applying for grants to add income so we can fund more initiatives, pay our staff, and help cover the cost of rent and utilities for our bookstores and office spaces. In addition, several long-time members of the Environmental Defenders have introduced us to a new funding source by generously making donations through IRA charitable rollovers, also called “qualified charitable distributions” (QCD). What is a qualified charitable distribution, why might you consider it, and what are the benefits?

Once you reach age 73, or if you turned 70½ in 2019 or before, you may be required to withdraw a certain amount of money from your tax-deferred retirement account each year – a required minimum distribution (RMD).

Since RMDs are taxed by the IRS as ordinary income, these normal withdrawals count toward your total taxable income for the year. They can effectively push you into a higher tax bracket and possibly increase the taxes you pay for Social Security or Medicare. A qualified charitable distribution – which is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity (and the Environmental Defenders qualifies!) – can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions for the year. And, since the amount donated is excluded from your taxable income, it actually makes it possible to benefit a charity of your choice while saving you money!

There are certain rules that must be met, and it's best to consult with a tax advisor and/or your retirement fund administrator to determine exactly when you need to take RMDs and if a QCD is appropriate for your particular situation. If you qualify (or will soon), we hope you'll consider this tax-free option to help us continue to defend the environment in McHenry County!

Sustainability in Wastewater Treatment in McHenry County

The final Best Management Practices (BMP) Talk and Tour of 2026 will highlight sustainability measures that wastewater treatment facilities can undertake. Fox Metro Water Reclamation District Director Karen Clementi will describe the many sustainability measures underway at the district, which serves the Aurora region and is the largest wastewater plant on the Fox River. Woodstock Wastewater Treatment Superintendent Anne

George will speak on how the city reuses its treated wastewater. Following the talk, attendees will have the opportunity to visit the Woodstock South Wastewater Treatment Plant to view its water reuse infrastructure.

The event takes place from 1 – 3 pm on Friday, Sept. 25 in Conference Rooms A and B of the McHenry County Administration Building, 667 Ware Road, Woodstock. The event is free, and people can attend either in person or virtually. The registration form can be found at tinyurl.com/BMPTourSignup.

This is the fifth year of the Talk and Tour series, co-hosted by the McHenry County Planning and Development Department and the Environmental Defenders. Citizens Climate Lobby

CCL Lobbys Congress for Climate & Clean Energy

The CCL Summer Conference and Lobby Day in D.C. was held on July 27-28, with around 850 CCLers in attendance from all 50 states! It's Citizens' Climate Lobby volunteers and staff's favorite week of the year!

At the conference on July 27, they had a busy day of lobby preparations and programming, including hearing from keynote speaker, Jigar Shah, former Director of the U.S. Department of Energy Loan Programs Office and one of the most influential voices in clean energy finance and deployment. He spoke about clean energy progress and his perspective on permitting reform opportunities. 94% of everything we added to the grid last year was clean energy! The recording of Jigar's complete presentation is available on CCL YouTube channel along with opening remarks by CCL Executive Director, Ricky Bradley and Building a BRIDGE to Capitol Hill to help attendees build skills for lobby meetings by Brett Cease, CCL's VP of Field Operations.



CCL's work offers a reminder that thousands of ordinary citizens—and our lawmakers—can bridge political divides, find common ground, and work together to solve one of our greatest shared challenges: climate change.

July 28, CCLers held more than 400 meetings with congressional offices on Capitol Hill focused on bipartisan permitting reform to unlock America's clean energy potential plus climate-friendly forestry policy, and funding for the U.S. Forest Service.

The messages CCLers brought in their meetings were reinforced by calls from CCL volunteers and supporters back home (including the McHenry Co. chapter), who made 2,247 calls to offices on the first day of the conference alone! The online tool identifies your Member of Congress based on your address and provides a simple, short script to follow. These calls helped to boost the impact of this year's citizen lobbyists, pictured above at the Library of Congress.

"My biggest surprise on lobby day is how close rather than apart many of our values are," shared New Jersey volunteer Karen D'Orazio. "It provides me with hope that we can bridge our differences and work together as a nation to reduce our carbon footprint and protect our children and our children's children"

PREPARING FOR A NEW SCHOOL YEAR

As the school year ramps up, we are ready for a great fall at MCSEEP. Our summer was restful while continuously working to inspire our youth to understand and appreciate the workings of nature and how it impacts our lives in every way. We had the delight of working with past Defenders award-winning intern Izzy Gregory. She continuously impressed us with her lesson planning, knowledge and positive attitude.

We hosted three immersive programs at the Algonquin Area Public Library District, at their Harnish Street location. Working with the library's early childhood team we curated unique soil and compost activities as well as sustainability tips for preteens and a "young scientist" discovery center. The grounds at the library were begging to be explored and we found caterpillars, moths, frogs, ants, and more.

Our longtime educator and contributor Gigi Carlson hosted a breakout room at the Regional Office of Education's Summer Conference. GROUNDWATER FESTIVAL

We are excitedly planning our 2026 Groundwater Festival alongside Scott Kuykendall, McHenry County's Water Resource Specialist and Bill Donato, former MCSEEP director and Woodstock

High School science teacher. In fact as you read this the event will hopefully (weather permitting) have taken place. It is one of the most rewarding and impactful days of the year for us. 120 students from nearby middle schools take a field trip to the Soil and Water Conservation District site near the Kishwaukee River Headwaters and dive into stations packed with field professionals, soil boring rigs, water testing, service projects and activities.
